SUMMER SAFETY TIPS

FOR KIDS WHO LOVE OUTDOORS

- APPLY SUNSCREEN WITH SPF 15 OR GREATER TO REDUCE THE INTENSITY OF UVRS THAT CAUSE SUNBURNS. APPLY IT 16 TO 30 MINUTES BEFORE SUN EXPOSURE.
- 2 DRINK PLENTY OF WATER AND FLUIDS WHEN YOU GO OUTSIDE TO AVOID DEHYDRATION AND KEEP THEM REFUELED.
- 3 LIMIT SUN EXPOSURE, ESPECIALLY BETWEEN THE HOURS OF 10 A.M. AND 2 P.M., UV RAYS ARE STRONGEST AT THESE TIMES ESPECIALLY ON SUMMER.
- TAKING TIME TO ENSURE THE OUTDOOR PLAY AREAS AROUND YOUR HOME ARE SAFE PROTECTS CHILDREN FROM INJURIES IN THEIR OWN BACKYARD.
- WHEN YOU'RE OUT ON THE TRAIL, WHETHER HIKING, CAMPING, OR HUNTING, PROTECT YOURSELF FROM MOSQUITOES AND OTHER BUGS BY USING INSECT & TICK REPELLENT.
- DROWNING IS AMONG THE LEADING CAUSES OF ACCIDENTAL DEATH IN CHILDREN. ENROLL YOUR KID ON A SWIMMING SURVIVAL PROGRAM ELSE ALWAYS SUPERVISE THEM.
- NOTHING PROTECTS YOUR CHILD BETTER THAN YOUR PRESENCE. ONE OF THE SUREST WAYS
 TO PROTECT YOUR CHILDREN OUTDOORS IS TO PROVIDE ADULT SUPERVISION. BY KEEPING AN
 EYE ON YOUR CHILDREN, YOU CAN STEP IN BEFORE INJURIES OCCUR OR
 RESPOND QUICKLY IF PROBLEMS ARISE.

Hi there! Welcome to Canyon of the Eagles! We hope you had a wonderful Spring and enjoyed some long walks on our trails before the heat of the Summer kicked in. You can still enjoy our trails if you head out early in the morning, our Bird and Butterfly trail is particularly shady and you'll be sure to spot some birds along the way. Look out for the beautiful Painted Bunting, this stunning little bird loves the Summer months in Texas. Read more about the Painted Bunting later.

Our wildflowers are beginning to die off, but in their place you'll notice the beautiful bright yellow and orange flowers of the Prickly Pear Cactus. Did you know the purple fruit of the Prickly Pear is used to make delicious jams, pickles and drinks? They are (as their name suggests) a very prickly plant. Look out for them on our Wildflower Walks with our Nature Guide, Celia. Just be careful not to touch them!

Now that the heat is rising, we need to be aware of sun safety and you'll see some tips about taking care of yourselves outdoors, and the importance of conserving water. If you have pets, please keep them safe too, the ground is much hotter than you think, so if you have a member of your family who has paws, please help to make sure they do not get them burned and ensure they have plenty of cool water to drink.

PAINTED BUNTINGS

What a beautiful site it is to spot a Painted Bunting! Around sunrise, males will perch and sing on top of the brush they live in.

When the brightly colored male is noticed, he is often mistakenly thought to be an escaped tropical bird! Male painted buntings are full of color! They are mostly red with bright blue heads, bright yellow to green shoulders and darker wings and tail. The females of both of these birds have duller colors. They can better hide from predators when sitting on nests and protecting their young.

Even though painted buntings are fairly common birds in much of Texas, you'll have to tread quietly to see one. They feel safe in deep brush, except when the male sings early in the morning, so they can be overlooked. So take your binoculars on our trails and be very patient.

Although primarily seed eaters, painted buntings rarely come to backyard feeders because they dislike being so far from cover.

They also feed on insects.

In the fall they migrate south to Mexico, Panama and a number of Caribbean islands.



Bees live on all the continents except Antarctica


They can grow up to 1.6 inches long
